We went to Capitol Hill and were able to meet with legislative staffers (and one congressman!) to discuss issues related to Physician Assistant practice in the United States. Kate met with her congressional representative, Greg Walden, Barbara met with the health care staffer for her representative, David Wu, and together they met with staffers for both Senators Wyden and Merkley.

The focus issues were:

1. PAs being able to sign orders for hospice and home health for Medicare patients
2. PAs being able to prescribe buprenorphine (Suboxone) for addiction treatment
3. PAs being eligible for Medicaid Electronic Health Record Incentives (HITECH)
